
TANAGERS: The populations of the SCARLET TANAGER was of great interest after the disaster of late May and early June. Birds died in droves apparently from lack of food since they arrived after an extended rainy period. The question was were these birds from the Vermont breeding population, or were they intending to go elsewhere? It is a question that can't be answered without knowing the "normal" breeding population. Notwithstanding, tanagers were reported from So. Strafford on the 18th of July, 3 on the 1st of June, 1 in Woodstock (JN), and 2 in Woodstock, June 8.



GROSBEAKS, SPARROWS, FINCH-ES, BUNTINGS: Although the group formerly called Fringillidae has been reclassified it will be dealt with here as in the old way, to include Grosbeaks, Finches, Sparrows and Longspurs.

The first member, the CARDINAL, seems to be still increasing, although its status is still probably local, more in the South and near town. Six individuals were reported from Bennington on two occasions. The ROSE BREASTED GROSBEAK had numerous sightings - individuals from So. Pomfret (FM), Ira (RAB), Shrewsbury (PE,LE,AFS), Woodstock (JN), Weathersfield (EE), Peru (RP), So. Strafford (H&ER) and pairs from So. Strafford and Woodstock.

Reports on the INDIGO BUNTING were from Ira, Bennington 2, Hartland 1, Weathersfield 1, So. Strafford 1, all of these on more than one occasion Symmet 1974

and was listed as increasingly in Winhall. The EVENING GROSBEAK a winter visitant, occasionally stays around for the summer. In 1974, reports came from Granville 1, (EH), Winhall, Peru 1, (TW,RP), and Chittenden where a pair appeared on and off and on July 12, a young appeared with a male adult at a feeder.(ED). Wm. Norse reports, the grosbeak "increased tremendously this year as a breeder." The PURPLE FINCH, is a resident in the state and pairs were spotted in So. Strafford 2, (H&ER), Shrewsbury 2, and Bennington 2 (MV) and N. Bridgewater. A HOUSE FINCH normally a western bird, was also seen' at Bennington (MV). PINE SISKIN another bird usually listed as a winter visitant, turned up in Bennington(MV) and nested in Wallingford. Dr. Peter Upton writes that on July 12, "a young siskin being fed by adults, was near his feeder and the nest was "definately nearby?" The bird apparently has also nested in Peru (WJN). AMERICAN GOLDFINCHES apparently had a good breeding year, after the previous one where they must have suffered damage, and 80 were reported on 17 cards.

The RED CROSBILL was present as a summer visitant in Winhall and may well have bred, (WJN). This is the only record.

RUFOUS TOWHEE: a regular breeder throughout Vermont was reported from Bennington 4, Weathersfield 3, and Hartland 2 (ES). There were two reports of SAVANNAH SPARROWS, 1 from Weathersfield (EE), the other from E. Barnard where probably transient nonbreeding bird was singing in early June (FM). The bird near Peru is a "rare and local breeder," (WJN). VESPER SPARROW: a record of two birds in So. Strafford on July 18 (H &ER) and several in unmowed grasslands in So. Woodstock and near Burlington (FO&BJ). DARK-EYED JUN-CO were reported from So. Strafford and a pair in Hartland in July.

The CHIPPING SPARROWS recorded indicate that the bird is common - almost as abundant as expected 28 individuals were seen. The FIELD SPAR-ROW records are concentrated in Weathersfield 6, with one report also from So. Strafford. The reports are all from June when the birds are singing and easier to find.

WHITE THROATED SPARROWS: were also common during the nesting period. Records are from Shrewsbury (PE,LE,AFS). So. Strafford, Woodstock (JN), and Hartland 1-4 birds each with a total of 22 individuals. The SWAMP SPARROW was not recorded as a "local breeder" (WJN), The SONG SPARROW was, as expected, the most abundant sparrow with 37 sightings.

FALL: 1 August - 30 November 1974 Marion Metcalf

Fall migration was well covered and interesting and informative information was revealed. There were no reports on Cuckoos, Barn Owls, Horned Larks, Brown Creepers, Water Pipits and House Sparrows.

LOONS: COMMON LOON reported 29 October, Lake Memphremagog; also two females in November (FO).

GREBES: Two PIED BILLS were observed 5 October at Marshfield Pond (MFM). PELICANS: WHITE PELICAN seen by most Vermont Birders on Dead Creek in Addison from 20 August through September (BBP,TW, and many others). Speculation exists as to whether this is the same Pelican seen at Montreal in the summer and in October on Martha's Vineyard.

CORMORANTS: One DOUBLE CRESTED CORMORANT on Tildy's Pond in Glover, 12 September (FO). DUCKS, GEESE AND SWANS: CAN-ADA GEESE, common migrants in flocks of ten to sixty from 6 September through 20 October (ECS,MFM, EE,FO).

SMALL RACE CANADA GEESE forty-five on 27 November on Lake Memphremagog(FO): 6 October, Weathersfield (EE).

MALLARDS, 6 September, three at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

BLACK DUCKS flocks up to forty reported, Dead Creek Lake Hardwick, and Newport (FO, TW).

PINTAILS, on 6 September, twenty were at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

GREEN-WINGED TEAL, 6 September, twenty were at Dead Creek (FO).

BLUE-WINGED TEAL, 6 on 31 August at Lake Hardwick (FO,BBC); 151 at Dead Creek on 6 September (FO, TW), 22 October, 2 were at Newport (FO,TW).

AMERICAN WIDGEON, 10 were observed at Dead Creek, 6 September (FO,TW).

WOOD DUCKS, 1 at Horse Pond, Glover, on 12 September (FO).

SCAUP, on 22 October at Newport, flock of fifty, probably all GREATER Bomoseen, flock of 35, probably all LESSER (EE).

COMMON GOLDENEYE, at Caspian Lake in Greensboro on 7 November, 8 females; 27 November, 40 at Lake Memphremagog (FO).

BUFFLEHEAD, on 27 October on a Woodstock Pond, 1 female (JMN): male and female on Lake Hardwick on 5 November (FO).

WHITE-WINGER SCOTER, on 8 October, 1 bird on Lake Bomoseen (EE).

COMMON MERGANSER, October, 1 on Caspian Lake (FO); 29 October, 20 on Little Hosner Pond in Craftsbury (FO,TW); on 7 November, 8 males, Caspian Lake (FO). HOODEDMERGANSER, 10 October, 2 were seen at Horse Pond, 1 in Glover (FO); 22 October, 3 at Newport and 7 November, 1 at Caspian Lake (FO).

RUDDY SHELLDRAKE, either female or immature male present on Lake Hardwick from 30 August through 11 September. First sighted by (FO) and also seen by (BBP,JP,BG, SBL,MFM). If a wild bird, this would be the third or fourth continental United States sighting. The possibility of it being feral remains.

HERONS: GREAT BLUE HERON, very common, 16 August to 2 October; 25 to 50 at Dead Creek (BBP,FO, JW,BBC); 31 August; 1 and 12 September at Lake Hardwick (FO,JW, BBC). Last report 22 October at Lake Memphremagog (FO,JW).

GREEN HERON, 5 on 6 September at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

BLACK-CROWNEDNIGHTHERON, as many as 25 from 16 August to 6 September at Dead Creek (BBP,FO, TW).

AMERICAN BITTERN, limited as always, but 6 seen 6 September at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

OSPREY: 1 at Lake Hardwick on 31 August (FO,BBC); 1 on 2 September, Lake Hardwick (FO); 1 on 5 September, Quechee (RAB); 1 on 6 September, Lake Hardwick (FO,TW); 15 observed on 14 September (HW); 1 on 18 and 19 September, Wallingford (BW); 1 on 22 September at Townsend (AM); 1 on 29 September, Walingford (BW); 1 on 26 Ocotber (HW); 15 observed on 15 September (HW).

AMERICAN VULTURES: TURKEY VULTURES continue to increase in Vermont. 2 September, 7 were observed in Addison (BBP,RT); 6 September, 15 seen at Dead Creek (FO, TW); 14 September, 1 at Weathersfield (EE); 4 October, 1 at Putney (RAB); 5 October, 1 at Pawlet (BW).

HAWKS and EAGLES: The Fall Hawk Watch added greatly to VINS data as well as to New England Hawk Watch figures. GOSHAWKS, 15 September, 2; 13 on 26 October; 3 on 27 September (CHW).

SHARP-SHINNED, 16 observed on September 14; seven on 15 September; 6 on October 26 and 1 on 27 October (HW).

COOPERS, 1 on 15 September (HW); on 20 September, 1 in Shrewsbury (AEP); 3 on 26 October (HW).

ROUGH-LEGGED HAWKS continue to be uncommon with only 1 reported for the Vermont Hawk Watch. Other sightings include 3 in Ira, 18 August (RAB); 1 on 27 August, East Randolph (RAB); 11 September, 1 at Brandon Gap (HW); 1 on 26 November near Woodstock (FO).

BROAD-WINGED HAWKS, on 26 August, 1 in Weston (RAB); on 2 September, 1, Lake Hardwick (FO, GE,WE); 6 September, 7 in one kettle at Dead Creek (TW,FO); 54 reported in Vermont Hawk Watch, 14 september - 15 September (HW); 1 on 15 September (BW); 26 October, Hawk Watch, 1.

RED-SHOULDERED HAWK, 4 on 2 September at Addison (BBP,RT); 32 on 14 September (HW); 4 on 15 September (HW); 13 on 26 October (HW).

RED-TAILED HAWK, 6 on 6 September at Dead Creek (FO,TW); 19 on 14 September (HW); 8 on 15 September (HW); 4 on 5 October, East Rupert (BW); 7 on 22 October, Lake Memphremagog (FO,JW); 68 on 26 October (HW); 5 on 27 October (HW); 1 on 30 November, Woodstock (FO).

MARSH HAWKS, 1 on 6 September, Dead Creek (FO,TW); 5 on 15 September (HW); 5 on 15 September (HW); 1 male 27 September, Otter Creek Valley (BW); 1 on 30 September, Craftsbury (FO); 1 on 2 October, Weathersfield (EE).

BALD EAGLE, 1 was seen on 15 September, Putney Mountain (HW). 1 on 17 October an Danby (B&WW).

FALCONS: PEREGRINE FALCONS, uncommon, as has been for quite a few years. 1, 11 September, Killington (RAB). 1 on 26 October (HW).



MERLIN, 1 on 5 September, Brownsville (RAB); 3 on 14 September (HW); 1 on 26 October (HW); 1 on 26 October, Springfield by (EE).

AMERICAN KESTREL, 1 on 2 September, Lake Hardwick (FO,WE,GE); 6 on 6 September, Dead Creek (FO, TW); 3 on 12 September, Northeast Kingdom by (FO); 49 on 14 September (HW); 13 on 15 September (HW).

PHASIANIDAE: GROUSE, QUAILS, PHEASANTS AND'TURKEYS,

RAILS, GALLINULES AND COOTS Special mention should be made of the unusual congregation of Shorebirds at Dead Creek in August and September of 1974. The lowering of the water level resulted in exposing mud flats and huge concentration of birds stopped to feed and were observed by many birders. The question is, do shorebirds always pass through the area and do not stop when the water level is normal. It presents an interesting study.

PECTORAL SANDPIPERS, 50 on 31 August; 200 on 1 September; 200 on 2 September, at Dead Creek (BPP); 60 on 6 September (FO,JW); 1 on 12 September at Lake Hardwick (FO); 4 on 22 October, Newport (FO,JW).

WHITE-RUMPED SANDPIPER, 2 birds on 31 August, 1 September, 2 September and 8 on 6 September at Dead Creek (BPP,FO,TW).

LEAST SANDPIPER, 12-15 on 31 August, 15-20 on 2 September, 1 on 12 September at Lake Hardwick (FO, JW,BBC,GE,WE); 30 on 6 September, Dead Creek (FO,TW). DOWITCHERS, 3 on 16 August and 1 or 2 at regular intervals until 2 September, all at Dead Creek (BPP). Also 1 short-billed Dowitcher on 6 September at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

SEMIPALMATED SANDPIPER, at Lake Hardwick, 3 were seen on 31 August, 4 on 2 September, and 1 on 12 September (FO,JW,BBC,GE,WE); 70 on 6 September at Dead Creek (FO,TW).

WESTERN SANDPIPER, 3 on 31 August at Lake Hardwick with Least and Semipolmateds (FO).

BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPER, 2 on 1, 2 September, Dead Creek (BPP).

GREAT BLACK BACKED, 1 on 22 October, Newport Dump (FO,JW). Rare for North Central Vermont.

HERRING GULLS, 1 on 31 August, Lake Hardwick; 1 on 12 September at Lake: Willoughby; 25 on 22October, Newport Dump; and 35 on 27 November at Newport Dump (FO,BBC).

RING-BILLED GULLS,25-30 on 6 September, Dead Creek; 2 on 12 September at Lake Willoughby; 6 on 8 September, Island Pond; a few at Lake Hardwick on 21 October; and 130 on 22 October at Newport (FO,TW,JW).

Mt. Holly had 1 on 9 September (EE); 1 on 12 September, Lake Willoughby; 3 on 12 September at Island Pond (FO); 3 on 15 September, Weathersfield (EE); 2 on 29 September, Rawsonville (AM); 1 on 11 November, north of Bethel (FM); and 6 in late November at East Craftsbury (FO).

VIREOS, a red-eyed vireo on 12 September at Craftsbury (FO); 2 Philadelphians and 1 Solitary on 2 September at Strafford by (H&ER).

WARBLERS, at Hartland (ECS), reported 6 BLACKPOLLS on 15 September; 4 YELLOW-RUMPED on 6 September and 1 on 15 September; 1 YELLOWTHROAT on 15 September; and 2 CHESTNUT-SIDED on 6 September; 1 YELLOWTHROAT on 19 October at East Craftsbury (FO); 1 CHESTNUT SIDED, 12 September, Lake Willoughby (FO); BLACK AND WHITES were observed on 2 September, 1 at Strafford (H&ER); and 1 at Strafford by (H&ER) and 8-10 on 12 September, Lake Willoughby (FO).

A PINE WARBLER was seen on 12 September, Ferdinand (FO); An OV-ENBIRD, 30 September, Craftsbury (FO); AMERICAN REDSTART, 12 September, Lake Willoughby (FO); A MOURNING WARBLER, 12 October, Rawsonville (AM); A YELLOW BREASTED CHAT!! (unusual for North Central Vermont) was netted and banded at Marshfield Pond; 28 August and was recaptured 31 August (MFM).

DARK EYED JUNCOS, in September, and October, Hartland (ECS); 2 on 11 November, Strafford (H&ER).

CHIPPING SPARROWS, small flocks 5-13 through September at Hartland (ECS). Seen occasionally in August Randolph (MCC). Seen in Strafford, September (H&ER) on 30 September 4 were observed in Craftsbury (FO).

FIELD SPARROWS, were seen in Hartland by (ECS) in September.

LINCOLN SPARROWS, 2 on 15 September, Hartland (ECS); 1 on 15 Sepber at Wallingford (BW); (2 on 15st September, 28 September, Strafford (H&ER).

AMERICAN GOLDFINCHES, 4 birds observed, 6 September in IHartland – (ECS). Occasionally in August at Randolph (MCC) and September at South Strafford (H&ER).

RUFUS SIDED TOWHEE, only 1 report in Hartland, 6 September by (ECS).

WHITE CROWNED SPARROWS, 12 birds in Hartland, 5 October (ECS); 12 in Wallingford, 9 October, and last seen there 24 October (BW); 2 at Newport, 22 October (FO).

PINE SISKINS, 10-12 seen, 30 October Wolcott (FO). No purple Finches were reported.

SAVANNAH SPARROWS, 1 at Craftsbury, 30 Spetember (FO).

SWAMP SPARROWS, 2 at Newport 22 October (FO).

LAPLAND LONGSPUR, a great bird for the records. 1 on 22 October at Newport (FO,JW).

SNOW BUNTINGS, 1 flock, 4 November at Reading (EHP); 1 flock at Andover, 5 November (EHP); 40 birds at Calais, 26 November (FO).
