SPRING MIGRATION '82

1 MARCH - 31 MAY WILLIAM J. NORSE, SEASONAL EDITOR

Unlike the early spring of 1980-81, the spring of 1982 was essentially a cold and late one, particularly in the early part. The winter of 1981-82 was a frigid unrelenting winter, with heavy snow cover and persistent cold which extended well into March, so that there was little early ice melting. There was no really warm weather in March until the very end, the temperature rising to 62° F on the 30th at Burlington. Early April was dominated by a ferocious snowstorm which hit the state on April 6 and 7, dumping as much as two feet in the mountains. Little fell in the Burlington area, but the unseasonable cold that followed this storm hit the whole state, with temperatures down to 13° F at Burlington on the 7th, the average for this day being 19 degrees below normal. After a few days it began to warm up and the temperatures for the rest of April were fairly mild, with a high of 79 F at Burlington on April 25th.

I would guess that there was considerable mortality of half-hardy migrants in the areas where the snow of April 6 and 7 was heavy. In my location (Winhall) the phoebes vanished after that storm and never reappeared at a number of breeding sites. Many Dark-eyed Juncos came to the feeder in a weakened condition.

The weather during the first week of May was a continuation of the mild weather of late April. Clear skies and dry air provided mild days and frosty nights. The morning of May 5 was the coldest with 22 recorded at Canaan, and 37 at Burlington. Temperatures then warmed up and reached the 80's by May 6, with Burlington recording 83 F. It was essentially dry and, with warm weather, the vegetation responded with rapid growth and the area began to quickly turn green.

The remainder of May was characterized by fair weather; wet, cool nights and warm days. The latter half of May became more rainy, with frequent thunderstorms and humid air. Warm weather with temperatures around 80° F prevailed after the 24th, until a wet period came in over the holiday weekend of May 29-31. Precipitation totals for May were below average all across the state and the average temperature was 1 to 3 degrees above the 30-year normal in most areas and a degree warmer than May 1981.

What did all this mean for the migration?

To begin with, the heavy freezes of the winter coated rivers and lakes with very thick ice which did not really begin to melt seriously until well along in April. The waterfowl migration, therefore, was much later than last year's very early one, and at such waterfowl staging areas as Herrick's Cove (Rockingham) some species, particularly Ring-necked Ducks and Hooded Mergansers, collected in good numbers, apparently waiting for the ice to melt farther north and in the mountains.

The April land bird migration was interrupted by the savage storm of April 6 and 7, and as I mentioned previously many species may have suffered considerable mortality. The ones that should be watched for declines would include American Woodcock, Killdeer, Common Flicker, Eastern Phoebe, Tree Swallow, Winter Wren, Hermit Thrush, Eastern Bluebird, both kinglets, Dark-eyed Junco, Song Sparrow, and possibly many others.

The last half of April includes our Hawk Watch, which was not very successful with only 518 individuals. This period, which was characterized by mild afternoon temperatures, nevertheless had many frosty nights and the wind was persistently in the north. Such conditions are not generally conducive to much migration, certainly not for migration en masse.

As for the May migration, I will quote statements by some of our most active observers. Frank Oatman writes "This was the most entirely uneventful spring migration I've experienced in Vermont - no pushes or waves or backup of migrants at all, simply a slow, steady trickle of birds returning - the birds did seem to arrive, albeit in very small numbers - there seems to have been almost no rain to hold back the migration."

Walter Ellison writes "The dull, drizzly weather which forces migrant waves never materialized this year, allowing for only an average migration. Most species which may be reasonably expected were recorded, usually on schedule or slightly late, and in less than remarkable numbers."

John Dye notes "No distinct waves of warblers."

At the VINS banding station they considered May 10 and May 17 to be the best days, with 10 and 13 species netted respectively.

Despite the generally later than average arrival of most species, a number of very early arrival dates were recorded, primarily at low elevation sites; in fact, here we have almost two migration schedules, one for the mountains and another for the valleys, both east and west.


The reason for this is obvious if one stands in the valleys on a May morning and looks up at the brown higher elevations. Particularly early dates were recorded for Broad-winged Hawk, Spotted Sandpiper, Common Tern, Eastern Phoebe, House Wren, Long-billed Marsh Wren, Yellow Warbler, Indigo Bunting, Rufous-sided Towhee, White-crowned Sparrow, and Swamp Sparrow.

Rarities are what everyone wants to hear about, and we had a few - Eurasian Wigeon, a possible Golden Eagle, Gyrfalcon, IVORY GULL* (a first state record), four reports of Hoary Redpoll* (*means subject to approval by the Vermont Bird Records Committee). Other birds of interest included - Red-throated Loon, Snowy Egret, Glossy Ibis, Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Glaucous Gull, "Brewsters" Warbler, and both crossbills.

The Birdathon was undertaken mostly on May 22 and a total of 173 species and 1 hybrid were recorded by participants. The "northern" team of Nancy Martin, Walter Ellison and George Ellison recorded 135 species. Another "northern" team of Lynn Erb, Debbie Davis, Bob Spear, Dwight Cargill and Jeff Allen also recorded 135 species. The "southern" team of Annette Gosnell, Don Clark and Chris Kibbe recorded 127 species. The team of Larry Metcalf, Tom and Mary Richards saw 120 species.

For the second year in a row, a free-flying Egyptian Goose has been recorded in the Champlain Valley; this year it turned up in March at the Burlington Waterfront (CWS etal.). Was it the same one that was around Ferrisburg and Charlotte last spring or was it another from the same source, possibly in Quebec?

Two hundred and twenty-two species plus one hybrid were recorded for Spring 1982, two less than last year.



LOONS AND GREBES

A total of 25 Common Loons was reported for the season: first one 4/17 over Howe Hill Hawk Lookout (EH), 1 4/22 Shelburne (WRB,MJM), 4 4/28 Lake Morey (ToM), 2 4/30 Thurman W. Dix Reservoir (hereafter TWDR) (MFM), 1 5/8 Winhall Hawk Lookout (hereafter WHL) (WJN), the max. count of 7 was at Holland Pond (EKT). There was one record of the Redthroated Loon - an adult in nuptial plumage at Shaftsbury Lake 5/8 (NLM,WGE etal.). There were reports of four Rednecked Grebes: 1 grounded in a yard at Hartland 3/4 (NSt),

rescued and released next day (ALG), 1 4/21 Herrick's Cove (hereafter HC) (MEC,REG), 2 4/30 TWDR (MFM). There were four Horned Grebes reported: 1 4/21 Burlington Intervale (DJP, $\overline{\text{CWS}}$), 1 5/1 Button Bay SP (NLM,WGE), 1 5/9 TWDR (MFM), 1 5/22 TWDR (LNM,MHR,TCR). Nineteen Pied-billed Grebes were reported: first 1 3/25 Mallets Bay (CWS), 1 4/4 Grand Isle (NLM,WGE), 2 4/15 HC (MEC), 1 4/17 HC (MEC), 1 4/17 Missisquoi NWR (hereafter MNWR) (TM), 2 4/20 Weathersfield (ELW), max. 4 5/22 Barton River Marshes (hereafter BRM) (NLM,WGE, GFE), also 1 5/22 Gale Meadows (Winhall) (WJN), 1 5/31 Rutland (RHH).


CORMORANTS THROUGH IBIS

There were four sightings of the Double-crested Cormorant totalling 24 birds: 1 4/15 HC (DC), 18 4/21 Orleans (RS), 3 4/23 MNWR (TM), 2 5/22 South Bay, Newport (WGE,GFE, NLM). The first Great Blue Herons were 3/21 1 at Colchester, 2 Keeler Bay (NLM,WGE), 1 3/22 Northfield (WHB), 1 3/25 Plainfield (JHa), 1 3/25 North Georgia (PSM), 1 3/25 St. Albans Bay (MJM), 1 3/25 Colchester (CNS), 4/7 Sand Bar Wildlife Management Area (hereafter SBWMA) (JDS), widespread after that, max. 8 4/12 South Burlington (MJM). Green Heron: first 1 4/23 Orleans (FO,DAM), 1 4/24 MNWR (TM), 1 5/2 Lake Morey (NLM, WGE), 1 5/11 HC (WJN), 1 5/13 Shoreham (ELW), 1 5/15 Lewis Creek (JID, MCD). The maximum was apparently one. There was one record of the Snowy Egret: 1 4/21 Starksboro (WRB,PMB). The first of five Black-crowned Night Heron reports was 1 4/17 Dead Creek Wildlife Management Area (hereafter DCWMA) (JSA), 1 4/23 MNWR (TM), 3 5/1 DCWMA (NLM,WGE) - which was the max., 2 5/22 Shelburne (JJA), 2 5/29 DCWMA (JID,MCD). WGE and NLM observed a goose 5/19 at Taftsville which they identified as a "giant" Canada Goose (Branta canadensis maxima). On 4/25 MJM, while hawk watching at Arrowhead Mountain (Milton) observed a small goose in a flock of 160+-, half the size of the others, which he feels may have been the "Richardson's" race. Finally on 5/3 at Newport, a flock of 12 birds was seen, made up of 11 small birds, followed by one much larger one (FO,JW). The spring 1982 Hawk Watch came up with a dismal 518 birds, far less than last year. 
