Steve Faccio, Conservation Biologist with the Vermont Center for Ecostudies will lead a discussion of wetland and riparian habitats, including a rich fen. David will talk about access improvements, invasive plant treatment and recent pre-commercial forestry work. Judith will talk about creation and maintenance of early successional habitats for various mammals, songbirds and pollinators with special attention to Monarch butterflies.

Our principal management objective is to **maintain a healthy forest.** To that end, we work to protect ecological function, increase carbon storage, promote a diversity of wildlife habitat, maintain water quality, improve timber quality and provide opportunities for community recreation.
